B. PERSONNEL/MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS:

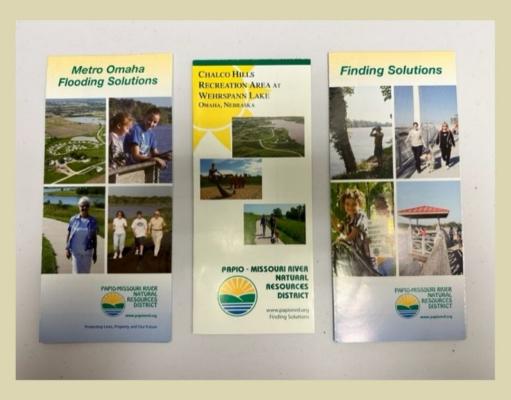

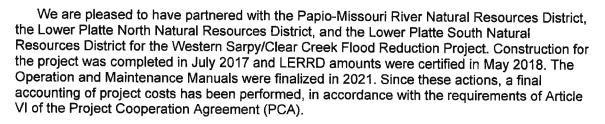

The final accounting of costs involved review of project funding and costs and Non-Federal Sponsor documentation for lands, easements, rights-of-way, relocations, disposal areas, commonly referred to as LERRD. Article VI.D of the PCA signed April 28, 2004, specifies that the results of the final accounting shall be provided to the Non-Federal Sponsor. A summary of the project's final accounting analysis of the cost-shared portion is as follows:

The total cost of the Western Sarpy/Clear Creek Flood Reduction Project is \$42,730,815.52. Federal contributions equal \$27,762,291.29. To date, the total contributions from non-Federal sponsors equal \$14,968,524.23 of which total cash contributions amount to \$10,201,706.00 and LERRD contributions amount to \$4,766,818.23. Based upon the cost share provisions of the PCA, the non-Federal sponsor funds meet the requirements of the minimum contribution of 35% of the structural flood control costs and the maximum contribution of 50% of structural flood control costs. The Western Sarpy Clear Creek Accounting file (enclosed) summarizes the final accounting of the project.

Subcommittee Meeting Minutes October 19, 2023

The meeting began at 9:05 am.

- 1. Introductions
 - a. Lori Laster (Papio NRD) facilitated introductions.
- Foundations of the PCWP
 - a. Lori Laster reviewed the mission statement of the Papio Partnership and why the Partnership was formed.
 - b. The NRD role in the Papio Partnership was also discussed. The NRD acts as the administering agent and is responsible for organizing meetings, holding and disbursing funds, and executing contracts as directed by the Partnership.
 - c. Outside of this, the NRD also has programs to provide assistance and costshare for projects for communities within the District. These programs address some of the same issues that potential policy updates are trying to prevent.
 - d. Eric Williams discussed that the urban cost share programs, especially those that assist with stream issues, have more requests than the NRD can fund. Long-term, preventing issues is better as we cannot guarantee that these funds will always be available to meet the needs of the communities.
- 3. Listening Session Follow Up Discussion
 - a. One of the key themes from the Listening Sessions was that there is a lack of data to show that the current policy isn't sufficient. Lori explained that there have been multiple studies completed in the Papio Watershed and that data has been presented multiple times. However, the data is technical and may not be easily understood by people without a technical background.
 - b. The 2021 stream setback policy recommendation was a result of a request by the City of Gretna and Sarpy County to look at ways to prevent public repair costs when developments are constructed too close to poorcondition streams. However, this recommendation was met with opposition from the development stakeholders.
 - c. Since the policy was proposed, the NRD has continued to work to solve some of the issues mentioned in opposition of the policy. The biggest issue



- was the potential time delays for obtaining 404 permits from USACE. The NRD has been working with HDR to prepare standard permitting documents for in-stream grade control.
- d. Another suggestion from the listening sessions was to have a more graduated setback calculation based on drainage area. The communities in attendance agreed that this approach would be difficult to implement and enforce and would prefer a standard setback for all areas.
- e. The discussion turned to trail connectivity and green space corridors as amenities and how setback areas could be used to meet this use as well. The Southern Sarpy Watershed Partnership has a draft policy that would allow passive recreation features to be built within the outer 30 feet of the setback area. This would include things like trails and playgrounds that don't require significant ground disturbance and would have a low damage potential.
- f. Lisa Smith (Omaha) stated that this could be tied into the climate action plans being developed by the City of Omaha, MAPA, and the State of Nebraska.
- g. The group in attendance agreed that removing the consideration of the future degradation in determining the setback area is acceptable for the new policy. However, the group would like the right to determine if additional measures are required when the stream conditions are already poor.
- h. Lori will develop some statements that could be included in future policy updates and send to the Partners to review. A working group with a cross section of stakeholders will meet in November to discuss the proposed policy changes before reaching out to a larger stakeholder group.
- 4. Update PCWP Member Dues
 - a. Member dues have been calculated based on population and area within the ETJ of each jurisdiction. At this time there is no proposal to adjust the total amount of funds collected each year, but the area and population numbers will be updated so the dues may shift for individual partners.
- 5. Other Items of Interest
 - a. Patrick Ducey from Nebraska Department of Environment and Energy will attend the next regular meeting to discuss the status of MS4 permits.
- 6. Next Meeting Date
 - a. The next regular meeting is scheduled October 26, 2023.
- 7. Adjourn
 - a. The meeting adjourned at 10:08 am.

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Meeting Minutes October 26, 2023

The meeting began at 10:03 am.

- 1. Introductions
 - a. Lori Laster (Papio NRD) facilitated introductions.
- 2. MS4 Permit Discussion
 - a. Patrick Ducey with Nebraska Department of Environment and Energy attended the meeting to discuss the status of stormwater permits and to provide NDEE staffing updates.
 - b. There are currently four new permit writers. All of them have stormwater experience, but are new to NDEE. There is also a new compliance section supervisor and Douglas County inspector.
 - c. NDEE anticipates a new MS4 general permit by July 1, 2024. There haven't been any substantial changes in regulations for MS4 permits so the new permit should be substantially the same as the current permit.
- 3. Watershed Plan Update
 - a. Sara Mechtenberg presented the first draft of the population/land use projection analysis.
 - b. GIS and Census data show that population growth and housing units are further along than the projections from the 2019 update. The starting numbers will be adjusted, however projection data from MAPA hasn't been updated since 2018 so growth rates will be assumed to be the same.
 - c. Partnership project costs have also been updated to reflect current land prices and inflation seen in recent construction projects.
 - d. These numbers will be refined and then presented at the November meeting to discuss what projects could be included in the 2024-2029 implementation plan.
- 4. October 19 Subcommittee Recap & Discussion
 - a. Lori Laster shared that the Subcommittee meeting on October 19 was well attended by Partner members and there was a lot of constructive discussion regarding potential policy updates for the next interlocal agreement.
 - A working group with representatives from member communities, developers, and designers will meet on November 15 to discuss potential



policy updates. Based on feedback during that meeting, the new policy language will be developed and presented at the November 30 Partnership meeting. There will also be stakeholder outreach to a larger audience in December (date to be determined).

- 5. Other Items of Interest
 - a. No other items of interest were noted.
- 6. Next Meeting Date
 - a. The next regular meeting is scheduled November 30, 2023.
- 7. Adjourn
 - a. The meeting adjourned at 10:45 am.
